**NOTE:** Do not focus on the exact track. Impacts can occur well outside the area enclosed by the cone.

#### Latest information

- Hurricane Warning remains in effect from Intracoastal City to Grand Isle.
- Tropical Storm Warning in effect Grand Isle to the mouth of the Pearl River, including the cities of New Orleans and Baton Rouge and west from Intracoastal City to Cameron.

#### Immediate Concerns

 Occasional bands of showers and thunderstorms with brief heavy rainfall today.

#### Long-Term Concerns

- Excessive rainfall 10-20 inches expected with significantly higher amounts possible. Lifethreatening flash flooding possible!
- Gusty winds 30 to 65 mph with some gusts near 75 mph near the center and in bands.
- Tornadoes and waterspouts.



# Storm Surge Watch/Warning

#### Tropical Storm Barry






- Storm Surge Warning in effect from Intracoastal City to Shell Beach.
  - 3-6 feet above ground
- Storm Surge Watch in effect Shell Beach to Alabama/Mississippi State line; includes portions of Lake Pontchartrain
  - 2-4 feet above ground
- Danger of life-threatening inundation from storm surge somewhere in the specified area within 36 hours.

## Expected Storm Total Rainfall

Tropical Storm Barry






- Storm Total rainfall forecast valid today through Thursday night
- Widespread I0 to 20 inches over a large area
- Areas around 25 inches or higher possible
- Locally, most rain will occur tonight through Sunday.

### Tornado Potential

#### Tropical Storm Barry





Main threat of tornadoes would be today however a few will still be possible Saturday and possibly into Sunday.




- Already seeing tropical storm force winds across most of the coastal waters, especially near Southwest Pass and to the west.
  - At Southwest Pass
    - Peak winds expected later this afternoon and early this evening. 35-40kts sustained with gusts up to 55kts. Near and just outside of the mouth of the river wave heights of 14-18 with occasional 22 feet is possible.
    - By Sunday morning winds will relax to near 25kts with gusts up to 40kts; wave heights 6 to 8 feet occasionally 12.
    - Sunday evening near 20kts with gusts up to 30kts; wave heights 5 to 7 feet occasionally 10.
    - Monday morning near 15kts gusts to 25kts; wave heights 4 to 6 feet occasionally 7.

# Expected River Flooding

Tropical Storm Barry





**Note:** This forecast is based on past precipitation and 48 hours of forecast rainfall

- Storm surge moving up the river would cause a sharp, but short duration rise on the Lower Mississippi River.
- Levees protect the city to 20 feet. The current forecast should remain just below this level.

#### Tropical Storm Barry



- Tropical Storm Barry located about 95 miles southwest of the mouth of the Mississippi River.
  - Barry's heading is west-northwest toward the Louisiana coast.
  - Hurricane Warning remains in effect from Intracoastal City to Grand Isle.
  - Tropical Storm Warning in effect Grand Isle to the mouth of the Pearl River, including the cities of New Orleans and Baton Rouge and west from Intracoastal City to Cameron.
  - Flash Flood watch remains in effect for the entire area.
- Heavy rainfall remains the greatest concern with widespread 10-20 inches with locally higher amounts near or greater than 25 inches possibly leading to lifethreatening flash flooding.
- Gusty tropical storm force winds, some storm surge and a few tornadoes are also threats through the weekend.
- Winds near southwest pass will relax some Saturday but more so Sunday and Sunday night.
